s a founding member of the symbolist group, Les Nabis, Pierre Bonnard (1867-1947) strayed from his peers through his interest in simple life rather than a focus on the mystic. It was his love for the power of colour and its ability to disregard the three-dimensional world that connected him to the group. His work did take on a rather dreamlike quality due to his ample use of bright colours, which vividly play together on his canvasses. The artist created his pieces from memory, using just sketches and notes for reference and dreaming of the piece before beginning. Bonnard also worked on multiple pieces simultaneously, moving from one to another to allow creativity and ideas of dimensions to flow fluidly and freely.








he Medici court painter Botticelli is one of the most brilliant artists of the Italian Renaissance alongside Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo, and Raphael. Favouring feminine portraits, Botticelli stands apart due to the finesse of his lines and the unbridled sensuality of his paintings. Between religious and private commissions, this Florentine artist introduced the profane into art through works of complex mythological subjects, such as the incontrovertibly masterful Primavera and The Birth of Venus, and knew how to delight the erudite patrons of art.

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
ean-Léon Gérôme (1824-1904) was a French sculptor and historical painter of the academic classical style: he is counted among the greatest representatives of the genre. His work distinguishes itself through strong sense of melodrama and eroticism. Many of his paintings were influenced by his travels in Italy, Egypt, and Turkey. His fame transcended borders and Gérôme became one of the most celebrated artists of the 19th century.

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
illiam Bouguereau (1825-1905) was a representative of French academic Classism and Classical Realism. Perhaps the greatest painter of the human body, he loved classical and historical themes and created modern interpretations of mythology and traditional subjects. In a time when the Impressionists reproduced modern life, Bouguereau devoted himself more intensely to idealised representations. His pure figures remind one of Greek mythology. Although today he is often forgotten, Bouguereau was a master in his time both in France and in the United States.

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
aul Gauguin (1848-1903) is perhaps one of the most colourful characters in the art world. With no formal training, he firmly placed his unique post-impressionist style forever in the arts by infusing exotic scenes with rich colours and incongruous proportions. A pivotal figure in symbolist art, the French painter was infamous for his alcoholism and lack of interest in established rules of society, which led to his time in Tahiti ¬ an inspiration for many paintings. Famous only in death, his expression and experimentation with colour would go on to influence artists like Matisse and Picasso.

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


est known for his stained glass windows, Swiss painter Augusto Giacometti (1877-1947) was highly skilled in many genres of art. Adorning two famed churches of Zürich, Grossmünster and Fraumünster, his stained glass is still considered some of the greatest in the world. As a painter, Giacometti lived and worked in some of the art world's greatest cities: Paris, Florence, and Zürich, but his hometown of Val Bregaglia would be the primary influence on his later works. As his style and brushwork varied and evolved greatly over his career, his mastery of colour as design became apparent. With colour as the focus of his paintings, Giacometti would become a pioneer for abstraction.


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



s a French painter of the Fauvist movement, Albert Marquet (1875-1947) is famous for his landscapes and seascapes. While he favoured a more muted palette than his contemporaries, the beauty of Marquet's work is displayed through the movement in his depictions of seas and lakes and the reflection of objects and the sky dancing in the water. The artist painted the Art Nouveau ornaments of the Grand Palais for the Exposition Universelle, but his playful and lively brushwork and innate understanding of light serve as his lasting mark on the art world.

amille Pissarro (1830-1903) had a great effect on many of his impressionist contemporaries, and he also served as an inspiration and mentor to other great masters such as Cézanne, Renoir, and Gauguin. He is credited with not only bolstering the Impressionist movement, but for keeping it alive in moments of difficulty. Deftly depicting the light and movement of village life, Pissarro primarily painted outdoors to catch the essence of his subjects. Distinguished by his thick and visible brushstrokes, his influence can be clearly seen in the works of Van Gogh.


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
is paintings carry the mark of his privileged upbringing; the influence of Florence, the struggle between nature and culture – from rolling landscapes to galleries filled with masterpieces – as well as the constant opportunity to partake in intellectual and artistic discussions all played an important role in his training and therefore in his art. 
redited with having created the fêtes galantes genre, Antoine Watteau (1684-1721) produced works that fused the gentle beauty of the bucolic lifestyle with a comedic and playful sense of theatricality. The French painter revitalised the Baroque genre by enlivening it with a more Rococo style, but his melancholy undertones of the frivolousness of life set him apart from other Rococo artists like Boucher or Fragonard. Watteau's influence on the arts is one of the most extensive in art history; his unique touch can be seen in paintings, costume, poetry, and film as well as the entire Impressionist genre.

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
ames Abbott McNeill Whistler (1834-1903) made his debut on the artistic scene at a decisive moment in the history of art and became **J** a pioneering figure. Whilst the Impressionists were embodying the epitome of the Avant-garde, Whistler's paintings reached a level of abstraction that had not yet been achieved. His portraits from this time in his life became his most renowned. His creativity, elegance and personality fascinated his entourage. A close friend of Stéphane Mallarmé and admired by Marcel Proust, Whistler played the perfect roles of the seductive dandy and the sentimental socialite, but all the while being both an astonishing artist and a bold innovator.





he Dada movement and then the Surrealists appeared in the First World War aftermath with a bang: revolution of thought, creativity, and the wish to break away from the past and all that was left in ruins. 
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
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he French painter Robert Delaunay (1885-1941) revolutionised the use of colour in art. Influenced by the French master Paul Cézanne (1839-1906), close friends with the French poet Apollinaire (1880-1918) and admired by the German painter Paul Klee (1879-1940), he founded the Orphism art movement together with his wife Sonia Delaunay (1885-1979) in the early 1910s. Geometric shapes and bright colours marked his way to a unique form of Abstractionism that earned him a place among the greatest artistic minds of the first half of the 20th century.



exican painting did not come to be internationally recognised until the early 20th century. It was the muralist movement, starting in the 1920s and strongly connected to the Mexican Revolution of the previous decade, from which such great artists as José Clemente Orozco (1883-1949), David Alfaro Siqueiros (1896-1974), and Diego Rivera (1886-1957) emerged. Rarely has art been more political. Thus, what Mexican muralists of the time put up on the walls of the most diverse buildings also tells the story of this ever so restless nation.








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### **RENE LALIQUE**

eading the way during the turn of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, René Lalique (1860-1945) was the master of glassworks. The French designer created Art Nouveau jewellery pieces for Cartier and Boucheron before opening his own shop. Through his glassworks, Lalique became a leader of the modern Art Deco style, and his hand can be seen on car hood ornaments, clocks, and chandeliers.









Orn in Austria-Hungary, the painter and photographer László Moholy-Nagy (1895-1946) taught at the German Bauhaus school. Among his initial influences were, most notably, the Dada movement and Constructivism. Known for his experimental approach to art, he introduced technology into his works and believed in art bringing forth social change. The rise of the Nazis forced him to leave Germany. He found a new home in America where he continued his lifelong quest to bring together art, technology, and education.

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
verybody knows about street art. Who has not seen these colourful "vandalism" displays plastered against walls or the side of trains? This aerosol art known as Pressionism is one of the major artistic revolutions of the 20<sup>th</sup> century and requires years of practice. The movement, which started in the United States, made its way to Europe, to Paris and more specifically to Saint-Germain-des Prés, before spreading across the globe. The official catalogue of the current Pinacothèque exposition, this work follows the main aesthetic developments of the graffiti movement.

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madeo de Souza-Cardoso (1887-1918), an artist who consecutively tried his hand at Impressionism, Fauvism, Futurism, Cubism, and Expressionism, was a pioneer not only for modern art in his home country, Portugal, but for Abstractionism all across Europe. Friends with Amedeo Modigliani, Diego Rivera, and Gaudí, he constantly merged tradition and modernism, thus developing a virtuous and unique style; his seemingly chaotic arrangements only revealing their inherent structure upon closer inspection.

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
he American photographer Alfred Stieglitz (1864-1946) was married to the American painter Georgia O'Keeffe (1887-1986). In 1905, he founded a gallery on New York's Fifth Avenue which simply came to be known under its street number '291'. The exhibitions he showed there, just like the art magazines he published and his own artistic creation, were crucial in giving photography a new status in the art world. Alfred Stieglitz turned photography into an accepted art form that was no longer considered as inferior to painting or sculpture.

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ohannes Vermeer, a 17th century artist, is recognised primarily for his genre scenes. Through meticulous precision in his paintings and drawings he achieved perfection and maximum impact. Unlike his predecessors, Vermeer used a camera obscura to bring even more perspective to his art in the most delicate of manners. He revolutionised the way in which we use and make paint and his colour application techniques predate some of those used by the Impressionists nearly two centuries later. *Girl with a Pearl Earring* remains his greatest masterpiece to this day.


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


ewell Convers, called N. C. Wyeth (1882-1945) has been cherished by generations of book lovers thanks to his illustrations of all-time classics such as *Treasure Island*, *Robin Hood*, and *Robinson Crusoe*. As one of the greatest illustrators in American history, he fashioned the way we imagine Long John Silver or Little John up to this day. In contrast to his achievements in book illustration, his painting is often overlooked. His Realist style has been carried on by his son Andrew Wyeth (1917-2009) and his grandson Jamie Wyeth (1946-).


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
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


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


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
illiam Hogarth wrote his Analysis of Beauty in 1753, during the Age of Enlightenment.
